

Certificate of Recognition

WHEREAS, In March of 1857 eight brave men and women - Henry Predaux, Thomas Elliot, Denard Hughes, James and Lavinia Woolfley, Bill and Emily Kiah, and one unidentified eighth person - set off on a historic journey for freedom; and

WHEREAS, a reward of \$3000 was offered for their arrest; a man who they trusted soon succumbed to greed and led them to the local authorities who put them in the Dover jail; and

WHEREAS, defying the odds they attempted a dramatic escape by smashing a window and miraculously jumping twelve feet to safety; and

WHEREAS, the pathway to freedom was a dangerous and perilous one but the bravery and courage of families and their abolitionist friends risked their life and property to preserve a universal principal of every human being to be free; and

WHEREAS, William Brinkly of Camden, Delaware, a brave conductor who operated in the Camden circuit of the Underground Railroad wrote a letter to William Still dated March 23, 1857 stating how he helped the Dover Eight, leading them to a life of freedom; and

WHEREAS, the story of the Dover Eight is a great historical moment in the history of the Delaware Underground Railroad.
